		please start?  ALT: G'day, everyone. I'm Tom. I'm from Australia. I'm thrilled to study English with you this year.  First, I'd like to teach you a casual greeting we say Australia.  "G'day!"	Whiteboard and pen
		(Write "G'day" on the whiteboard.) Repeat after me. "G'day".  G'day is a combination of "Good" and "Day". Australian people say "G'day" as well as "Hi" or "Hello." Okay, try and say "G'day" to your neighbours.  Excellent!

In general, the sun is stronger in Australia in comparison to Japan. The "NO HAT, NO PLAY" rule is applied in Australian schools.
